Provide as much information as possible including their name, number, email, address and birth date.



### Essential Safety Tips After A Storm

### Generators

Only use generators outdoors and never in an attached garage.

Keep the generator at least 20 feet from doors, windows, and vent openings.

**Before** refueling, shut down the generator and allow it to cool.

Ensure working carbon monoxide alarms are present prior to use.

Never connect generators to household wiring without installing a transfer switch. A transfer switch helps to keep electricity traveling in the correct direction and helps protect utility workers from electrocution.

#### Candles

**Never** leave a burning candle unattended.

**Keep** candles away from children and pets.

Place candles in a sturdy candle holder and on a flat surface.

**Ensure** working smoke alarms are present prior to use.

**Keep** hair and loose clothing away from the flame.

# What to do to <u>protect</u> yourself from electrical hazards

Hurricane Helene caused power outages and downed power lines across the Southeast. As recovery begins, remember to avoid fallen power lines. Downed power lines can look harmless, but they can carry an electric current strong enough to cause serious injury or possibly death.

- Never touch a fallen power line. Call the power company to report fallen power lines.
- Avoid contact with overhead power lines during cleanup and other activities.
- Do not drive through standing water if downed power lines are in the water.
- If a power line falls across your car while you are driving, stay inside the vehicle and continue to drive away from the line. If the engine stalls, do not turn off the ignition. Warn people not to touch the car or the line. Call or ask someone to call the local utility company and emergency services. Do not allow anyone other than emergency personnel to approach your vehicle.

### **STAY OUT OF FLOODWATERS!**

From the <u>US National Weather Service Columbia South Carolina</u>: Many of our area rivers remain in flood today. Please use caution if you work or live near a river or other swollen body of water.

Floodwaters can easily conceal a variety of dangers, do not walk or swim in them. If you encounter a flooded roadway, remember to turn around, don't drown and please do not drive around posted barricades.

If you have any specific questions or concerns about whether the flooding will impact your home or work, please reach out to your county emergency management office.




### **REMOVE STANDING WATER**

From **South Carolina Department of Public Health**: Following periods of heavy rain and flooding, please remove standing water to help control mosquito populations.

Mosquitoes can develop in water that stands for more than five days. DPH recommends getting rid of all standing water to control the mosquito population around your home and property.

Carbon monoxide (CO) is an odorless, colorless gas that kills without warning. It claims the lives of hundreds of people every year and makes thousands more ill.

Many household items including gas- and oil-burning furnaces, portable generators, and charcoal grills produce this poison gas.

Never use a portable gas camp stove, charcoal grill or portable generator indoors or in a garage, even if doors and windows are open.

Only use generators outside, more than 20 feet away from your home, doors, and windows.

Additionally, install battery-operated or battery back-up CO detectors near every sleeping area in your home to alert you to CO poisoning.

#### **Picking Up the Pieces After a Disaster**

Dealing with a disaster is never easy. Here's some advice to help you avoid common post-disaster scams, protect your personal information, and how to back on track financially.

#### **How to Avoid Clean-up & Repair Scams**

- Be skeptical of anyone promising immediate clean-up and repairs. Some may quote outrageous
  prices, demand payment up front, or lack the skills needed.
- Check contractors out. Before you pay, ask for their IDs, licenses, and proof of insurance. Don't
  believe any promises that aren't in writing.
- Never pay by wire transfer, gift card, cryptocurrency, or in cash. And never make the final
  payment until the work is done and you're satisfied.

#### **How to Spot Impersonator Scams**


- Know that FEMA doesn't charge application fees. If someone wants money to help you qualify for FEMA funds, it's a scam. The best place to get information is <u>FEMA.gov</u>.
- Guard your personal information. Only scammers will say they're a government official and then
  demand money or your credit card, bank account, or Social Security number.
- Know the signs of a rental listing scam. If anyone asks for a security deposit or rent before you've
  met or signed a lease, that's a scam. Steer clear.

#### **How to Get Back on Track Financially**

You may have left home without IDs, checks, credit and debit cards, and other documents. And you might not have access to your bank account or paycheck for a while. What comes next?

#### **Managing Money**

Report lost credit, ATM, or debit cards to the card issuer as soon as possible.



#### Managing Credit

- Get your free credit report at <u>AnnualCreditReport.com</u>. This can help if you've lost financial
  records and need to identify creditors.
- Talk to creditors, landlords, and utilities as soon as possible. They may be willing to work with you
  to avoid late fees, postpone collection, repossessions, and foreclosures.

#### **How to Replace Damaged or Lost Documents**

Here's a list of where to go for what.

- · Recorded real estate documents: County's recorder of deeds
- Mortgages: Lender or mortgage servicer
- · Leases: Landlord or property management company
- · Car title/driver's license: Secretary of state or department of motor vehicles
- · Birth certificate: Vital statistics office from county where you were born
- · Social Security card: Local Social Security Administration office
